## **Q**: If I am seeing patients in person do I need to wear a protective gown? What is a safe "lifespan" of the mask and the gown?

### **Q**: If patients have no COVID-19 symptoms and are seen in the office, say for MSK injuries, does the clinic room need to be sanitized in between?

### **Q**: Instead of reinventing the wheel, why not come up with one document for family physicians' offices for us all to follow. Would be greatly appreciated.

A: Many documents including those from BCCDC, Doctors of BC, WorkSafeBC, CPSBC and the Divisions of Family Practice link to each other. ### **Q**: Any guidelines for MDs at a clinic, socializing in the lunchroom, having meetings in close quarters after seeing patients in the clinic for non-essential issues?

#### Q: Do the walls of the treatment room need to be cleaned in between appointments/patients?

A: Floors and walls should be kept visibly clean and free of spills, dust and debris. These are potentially low touch surfaces depending on the room and could require daily cleaning. For more information, please refer to:

#### Q: How do you clean a BP cuff?

A: Hospital grade disinfectant (e.g. disinfectant wipes) should be used to disinfect smaller patient care equipment (e.g. BP cuffs, electronic thermometers, oximeters, stethoscope) after each use.

### **Q**: Many family practices are unable to access PPE and there is no sign of it coming. What are we to do if a patient requires an exam and there is no PPE available?

#### **Q**: I work in a private clinic with allied health professionals (PT, OT, RMT, etc.). Any recommendations on providing community care (in patient homes)?

#### **Q**: If hairstylists are resuming clients one on one, then what is different about healthcare for patients that are not ill?

A: These employers are also required to develop safety plans.

#### **Q**: Island Health states that for primary care of patients at low risk of having COVID 19 only a surgical mask and hand hygiene are necessary. Is this true?

A: Phase 2 of the business reopening.

### **Q**: What is a physician's legal and ethical obligation to working in the ER, in a situation where there is a deficiency of adequate, recommended PPE?

#### Q: What is the best way to disinfect examining tables and equipment between patients?

Q: If our practice is in a Health Authority, changes may not be in our control. What do you suggest? A: You must follow PHO orders firstly. Each Health Authority may have its' own nuances as set out by the MHO.

### **Q**: Is there a recommended amount of time that the exam room needs to sit empty after an asymptomatic patient is seen?

A: Follow cleaning protocols as per guidance documents:

#### **Q**: My clinic refused to support my request that I assess all patients first virtually, to minimize direct contact (PHO order March 23). My options?

A: PHO orders must be followed.

#### **Q**: Do you have a washer for the washable gowns? We have purchased some but aren't sure how to clean them...in our own personal home washers?

#### **Q**: There is lots of evidence about laughing, coughing, singing and sneezing aerosolizing. Do we need N95 for all patient encounters?

A: Following contact and droplet precautions.

### **Q**: What are our responsibilities to provide PPE to learners (residents, medical students, PA students) vs. university/medical school responsibilities

#### Q: What are the safe methods or touchless methods to receive payments from patients

A: From personal experience: debit and credit card tap.

### **Q**: What is the evidence around transmission of COVID-19 from paper--books, pamphlets, magazines? What precautions are relevant to our clinics/waiting rooms?

A: There is no evidence that the COVID-19 virus is transmitted via paper or other paper-based products. As such, there is no need to limit the distribution of paper resources, such as leaflets, to patients because of COVID-19. # What is one change in the hierarchy of controls that you have made or heard of to reduce risks in the clinical setting?

#### Procedural

- Patient waits in car until we are ready
- Space face to face appointments to 1 per hour to allow for cleaning and prep
- Staggering in-office visits to allow for infection control procedures and no more than one patient at a time in the office
- Getting all patients to call before coming in to screen for symptoms
- Stop sign and locked door to stop the walk ins
- Vaccinations through open car window in the parking lot
- Have added handouts to our website instead of distributing
- Providing baby weighing scales for patients to sign out in cases where they need frequent weight checks (preemies, slow-to-gain, etc)
- All physicians in the office work a different day per week
- We are part of a group of clinics in our community who have centralised physical exams in one clinic to see our patients
- Direct traffic flow in one direction

#### Virtual

- Conducting virtual visits through while maintaining distancing separate exam rooms have been set up for providers and patients, they connect virtually through the EMR. Provider is in one exam room and the patient is in another
- Switching to telehealth visits/online telemedicine appointments
- Only have office visits after phone/virtual assessment

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#### Protocols

- Plexiglass and physical barriers at reception
- Hand sanitizer in each room
- Adequate PPE and access to it; PPE in one room for don/doff
- We wipe down between each appointment all exam tables and equipment
- Our staff wipes down the whole clinic twice a day
- Bright tape on the floor
- Chairs removed
- We have separated doctors and staff into separate teams with no overlap
